Show season has started, and this is your year to show. That's right. This is your year to step into the reining pen for the very first time. Got your hat, got your show shirt and chaps. Oh yea, got the horse too. You've been working hard, and you're ready. It's time to strut your stuff. Just one thing left to do - paperwork.

Non Pro Declaration, Competition License, NRHA Memberships - it's enough to make your head swim. Well have no fear, the *Penalty Box* is here to help you through this process.

All NRHA approved shows require membership for both horse and rider. All horses need a Competition License. A horse's Competition License is permanent and does not have to be renewed.

A NRHA membership is necessary for all riders. If you're planning on showing in Youth, Non Pro, or Rookie classes you also need to submit a one time Non Pro Declaration.

To summarize the NRHA requirements:

- Competition License for your horse.
- NRHA Membership for rider
- Youth, Rookie, and Non Pro need to submit a Non Pro Declaration.

Membership and Non Pro Declarations can be submitted to NRHA prior to the show, or at any NRHA approved show. The competition license must be applied for prior to showing the horse, and can not be applied for at the show.

In an attempt to make this process easier for you, the NRHA has these forms available for you on their website. Go to nrha.com and you'll see "Forms & Documents" available under the "NRHA" tab. You'll find the 2009 Membership Applications listed at the top of the page. For complete membership and licensing information, please refer to the NRHA handbook available on the NRHA website.

In order to be eligible to participate in the NRHA affiliate program, you must be a member of a NRHA affiliate. If you belong to more than one affiliate, you need to complete a NRHA Affiliate Declaration form. For those of you wishing to become RMRHA members, you'll find a membership application included in this newsletter.

Still have questions? Please don't hesitate to ask them! Feel free to contact any of the RMRHA Board members with your questions. The knowledgeable and helpful RMRHA trainers are an excellent resource for you as well. Contact information for the Board members and trainers is available on the RMRHA website, rnrha.com.

Slide this year on her Quarter horse, Gallos Smart Chic.

“Behind every cloud is a silver lining.” This old saying aptly describes the experiences of eighteen year old RMRHA youth member, Ande Molloy. Ande, who is preparing to graduate from Faith Christian Academy, became involved with the sport of reining because of a cloud in her life: a thirteen year-long struggle with the pain of arthritis. Miss Molloy, from Golden, Colorado, hopes to attend Laramie County Community College to study nursing. Her desire to study nursing also

arose from her difficulty with arthritis. More specifically, she has interest in helping people who are ill because she too has experienced life’s setbacks. Even through her years of pain, however, there shone a light of hope...horses.

It was originally this pain that brought horses into her life. Like many others, riding horses was therapeutic to Ande, but it didn’t stop there. After having watched reining from the sidelines, she became hooked and knew that reining was something she wanted to pursue. However, when she first began to rein, the sport proved to be more difficult for her than she thought it would be. It was only through determination and

persevering after failure that Ande Molloy did, in the end, achieve many of her goals. Along the trail of failure and success, Ande experienced the blessing of learning from numerous different trainers, horses, and training methods. These experiences prepared her for tough rides she had ahead of her. After a while, she did indeed taste the benefits of “hanging on even when it’s tough,” as the saying goes. Ande’s hopes for the future now include her wish to have a family and a rewarding job. She also desires to ride in all of the Colorado NRHA shows this year on her American Quarter Horse, Solanos Seventeen, also known as Hershey.

After having ridden horses for eleven years, Ande can rightly encourage others, as she says, “Stick with it; it will pay off in the end,” and “Have fun!” Also as a word of encouragement, Ande further suggests that riders should rein for the love of the sport, and not so much because winning is rewarding.

Through Ande’s life, we can all catch the light of hope that glows behind pain. For Ande Molloy, this difficulty with arthritis actually turned out for the best, as it gave her a love of horses, a lesson in long suffering, and a longing to care for people. She has shown us that tenacious determination truly can prevail over even the greatest of odds. Perhaps we too can learn from Ande that what seems like a burden that can’t be overcome, can actually turn out for our benefit if only we will maintain a firm resolve to never give up!

A phrase often heard at a horse shows is, “winning isn’t everything”, this rings true to Jordan McMall of Loveland Colorado; to Jordan winning is the icing on the cake. Having fun and learning from every ride is what is important.

Jordan is a senior at Thompson Valley and plans to attend college in the fall. Jordan has three sisters; Shelby, Paige and Shay. Before she began reining Jordan rode barrel horses. She started reining after her older sister Paige, and trains with Lance Shockley.

Jordan’s achievements in the sport of reining are winning the Sagebrush Slide 13 and under and being a part of the Summer Slide team tournament, where her team took third place and she received a three hundred dollar scholarship.

Jordan’s advice to riders that are just beginning is to stick with and to remember practice makes perfect and enjoy the rides

you have - don’t always think about winning. Go out there and have fun because that is what it is all about.

The "Volunteer Hours" rule, which requires all youth to attend a minimum of 3 meetings, volunteer a minimum of 2 hours at any RMRHA show, and participate in a minimum of 1 fundraiser, is now in effect. To receive your year-end awards, you need to participate in the Volunteer Hours rule, and fill out the Participation Forms, which are available on the website. 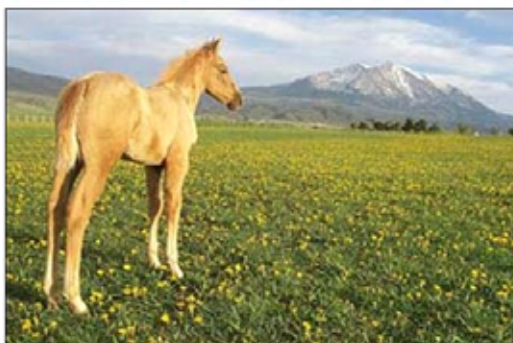
