NRHA now offers metal trophies to NRHA exhibitors!

Co-Champions losing the flip of a coin for awards, duplicate trophies and title winners (world champions) are extended the option of ordering a metal trophy following the completion of the respective NRHA approved events. Trophies can be ordered by completing the Co-Champion & Duplicate order form located on the NRHA website and paying applicable fees. This form is located on the NRHA website, www.nrha.com.

RMRHA has instituted a program whereby members who wish to qualify for year-end awards are required to volunteer a minimum of 4 hours in support of the association. This volunteer program was developed in an effort to get members more involved in RMRHA.

In order to be eligible for a year-end award, each rider will need to:

1. Volunteer at least 4 hours at a RMRHA sanctioned activity or event.
2. Complete a Volunteer Form and submit it to the program administrator.
3. Riders who have not met the volunteer hours requirement may become eligible for year-end awards in exchange for a contribution of \$100.
4. For youth riders to be eligible for year-end awards in any division, he/she must meet the requirements outlined in the Youth Year-End Awards program.

There are many opportunities to volunteer, such as:

- RMRHA sanctioned shows: Various opportunities to volunteer at each affiliate/year-end show. Contact each show management team for more information.
- Participate on an RMRHA Committee: Utilize your skills on a RMRHA Committee. There are many

- RMRHA clinic or activity: A successful event is the result of many hours of planning and organization and through the efforts of volunteers during the event. This is a great opportunity to meet other members and to assist in putting on a successful event.

Vaccines, the Immune System, and your Horse

Vaccinating horses is beneficial in helping your animal remain as healthy as possible despite exposure to disease on a daily basis. It does have some risks involved, but does help achieve the goal of better health.

To begin with, what is it that we are doing when we vaccinate? Vaccines are designed to effectively stimulate an immune response to a specific disease causing agent and create a memory to be readily able to fight it if exposed to the disease in the future. The immune system, which the body uses to remove and ward off harmful or foreign agents, is the foundation for this. To explain this in an extremely simplified manner; it is made up of a complex interaction of various ranks of cells, somewhat similar to soldiers in an army (i.e., officers, enlisted men, etc.) that fight a constant battle to keep the body healthy from disease and foreign material. These soldiers need training to know what to attack and how to eliminate it. Vaccines help train and arm the cells of the immune system to fight off specific threats and create an effective immediate response system to have the soldiers prepared for action in the future. As this system works it may be seen as various forms of physical symptoms such as fever, pain, swelling, and lethargy to name a few. Some of these signs are an indication that the vaccine is working effectively.

There are many factors that can influence a vaccines ability to stimulate a protective response. Most vaccines contain an antigen (the whole or part of the agent that is the target). This is intended to show the immune system and create a memory for the future. In cases of booster vaccines it sort of reminds the immune system of what it looks like. Somewhat like a police photo. They also contain an adjuvant (a substance that aids another) that helps the immune system to more readily recognize the antigen and enhance a response to it. This may be similar to giving someone glasses to help see the police photo. Different vaccines, or even brands of vaccines, usually contain different components of the two, more commonly the type of adjuvant. Different combinations may be more effective than others. This can lead to variability in response of some vaccines as compared to others. Individual animals can even have physically different responses based on the adjuvant used.

Health, stress, medications, and age can play important

roles in vaccine response. Any one of these can be a cause of vaccine failure. Animals in poor health may not be able to respond well to vaccines. Hormones related to stress, such as adrenaline and cortisol, can have very strong effect at reducing the immune systems ability to effectively respond (immunosuppression). Antiinflammatories (Bute, Banamine, Equioxx) and some steroid treatments may render vaccines ineffective by inhibiting the immune system. Appropriate timing of these types of medications around vaccinations may be important. Researchers have suggested allowing at least 8-72 hrs for the vaccines to work before utilizing such medications. Age is also relative to the ability of the immune system to respond. Young animals often do not have “experienced” exposure to various antigens. Older animals just have a decreased ability to respond. This may dictate a greater need for initial vaccination or boosters.

Many who have experienced vaccination personally or with children probably noted some of the responses seen with stimulation of the immune system. In a majority of the cases with horses we don't notice significant physical symptoms. In other cases more dramatic

Vaccines, the Immune System, and your Horse (cont)

symptoms are noted. This can often be related to the individual animal's response to the vaccines. Some of the typical responses can include lethargy (dumpy or depressed), poor appetite, fever (2° rise in temperature can be normal), muscle soreness/stiffness, or swelling around the injection site. Many of these signify an appropriate stimulation of the immune system. These symptoms are usually transient and can appear after a couple of hours and even last out to a couple of days. They are often self limiting, but in some cases may need to be addressed. If the horse can get along with just feeling a little off they should be fine. If the symptoms are greatly affecting their normal functions a more proactive approach may need to be taken. Anti inflammatory medication (i.e. Bute, Banamine, or Equioxx) often will help get them through it. If the symptoms are severe enough, or persist, it may warrant a call to your vet before they lead to systemic disturbances. These are rarely life threatening situations.

More significant symptoms can sometimes be seen too. These are often related to histamine (the substance responsible for allergies). Any type of substance can be a culprit for causing hypersensitivity or anaphylactic response that leads to histamine release and possible systemic reaction. Sometimes vaccines can be responsible. In many cases these types of reactions are mild, but they can quickly become life threatening and require immediate attention. It is hard to predict the direction they may go. Signs of anaphylaxis are hives, itching, swelling of various body parts, hyperexcitability, difficulty breathing, wheezing, colic, diarrhea, weakness, or death. Immediate attention and special medications are often needed to treat them.

Another area of great confusion I often see is what to expect from vaccinations. People often feel that they are getting 100% protection of disease from the vaccines given to their ani-

mals. Vaccines are rarely 100% protective. Vaccine licensing requirements for animals can vary due to different label claims. They can vary from full protection of disease to just limiting spread in population of animals. People may be surprised at the somewhat minimal requirements for animal vaccine approval. Many vaccines are really not proven until tested in the field for some time. Vaccine companies and the USDA try to ensure that adequate and effective products are available, however, sometimes that can't be proven until used on large numbers in variable field situations.

Other factors can affect the degree of protection provided to horses by vaccines. Among these are individual vaccine's efficiency, individual animal's response, physical state of the animal, conditions present at the time of vaccination, proper vaccine storage, proper administration, proper vaccine selection based on prevailing risk factors, and individual management conditions. Sometimes these factors may be hard to muddle through for what is best in a given situation. Consultation with qualified individuals may be helpful in this respect. They may help provide information that may help direct you to the optimal way to protect your animal(s).

NRHA Handbook Clarification Green Reiner Classes

Please note the following clarification – There is a contradiction in the 2011 NRHA Handbook regarding the use of two hands in NRHA Green Reiner classes. Page 70 L. (12) states, “the rider may use one (1) or two (2) hands at any time during the pattern.” However, page 102 (d) states “In NRHA Green and Ride classes, the rider must not change hands or switch from one to two hands.” Page 102 is the correct rule: riders in the Green class may ride one or two handed but may NOT switch from one to two hands. Riders who switch from one to two hands in this class should received a penalty score zero. Need to download the NRHA Handbook? Go to the Forms area on the NRHA website.
